

Temple Sowerby

Compared with all other villages.

Somewhat unusually almost one third of houses in Temple Sowerby have kneelers and 35% feature 970.

Compared with Bolton, Cliburn, Culgaith, Kirkby Thore and Newbiggin.

Temple Sowerby and Kirkby Thore differ from the other villages in having having predominantly terraces or agglomerations of houses; with two thirds of Temple Sowerby being described in that way with Kirkby Thore a slightly lower proportion. This is perhaps reflected in one fifth or more of houses in both villages possessing façade type 212, though Newbiggin has the same proportion.

Temple Sowerby and Kirkby Thore are also similar in possessing approximately equal numbers of boulder and chamfered plinths (a fifth to one quarter) whilst Temple Sowerby has roughly equal numbers of quoins A and B. Temple Sowerby also differs in having a higher proportion of roofs with green slate. However, all the villages, with the exception of Bolton, are similar in having few or no facades of 'vernacular' facades 200-209 and all (but Bolton) in having one third or more of houses with façade type 210.

About half the houses in the village are described as sandstone, a proportion similar to the others, except Culgaith and Newbiggin. Again all the villages are similar, except from Newbiggin in having two thirds or more of houses with windows with stone or cement surrounds. And the villages differ from Culgaith in having few or no outshots. However, about one quarter of hpuses in Temple Sowerby possess stair windows across two floors, a proportion very similar to Bolton and very different from Cliburn.
